Four years ago, Rob and Cheryl McEwen established the McEwen Centre for Regenerative Medicine with a \$10 million gift. With tremendous foresight and keen sense of the possibility of the future, the McEwens have renewed their commitment to regenerative medicine and stem cell research with a second gift of \$10 million. This is the largest cumulative donation to regenerative medicine in Canada.

"We are extremely excited to receive this additional support for stem cell research and regenerative medicine. I believe that it will help us recruit and retain the best scientists in the field. The opportunities that this gift

provides will undoubtedly result in major advances in regenerative medicine," said McEwen Centre Director Dr. Gordon Keller.

A leading stem cell researcher, Dr. Keller was recruited from New York's Mount Sinai School of Medicine following the McEwens' first \$10 million gift. He joined Dr. Rudi von Harsdorf who was recruited from Berlin, Germany to be the Robert R. McEwen Chair in Cardiac Regenerative Medicine. Both researchers are part of an "all-star" complement of 15 scientists who are leaders in regenerative medicine and stem cell research in Canada.

This new funding will support several initiatives at the Centre, including recruiting new talent from around the world with the establishment of a fellowship program; the development of an embryonic stem cell laboratory and imaging facilities; and a program to support the commercialization of discoveries emerging from the McEwen Centre. These projects are part of a 10-year plan to position the centre as a world leader in stem cell research.

These contributions have garnered the attention of new donors, including the St. George's Society. This past April, the Society presented the McEwens with the St. George's Society Award of Merit along with \$500,000 raised at the Red Rose Ball for the McEwen Centre.

The McEwen Centre for Regenerative Medicine was established in 2003. Its mission is to accelerate the development of better and more effective treatments for life-threatening conditions such as heart disease, diabetes, respiratory disease and spinal cord injury and be a world-renowned centre for regenerative medicine and stem cell biology.

Compassion and caring for patients drive surgical innovation

In an environment of complex surgeries and the continued push for innovation, patients come first and are the centre of University Health Network. This was the message of UHN Surgeon-in-Chief Dr. Bryce Taylor at the Spring *Behind the Scenes* lecture held last May.

Dr. Taylor also thanked the group of 100 attendees at Toronto Western Hospital for their financial support. "Many advances would never see the light of day were it not for our generous donors," he said.

Leading one of the largest surgical programs in North America, Dr. Taylor works with a team of over 120 surgeons as well as several hundred surgical nurses and support staff. The "committed and accomplished" surgical staff work in a state-of-the-art surgical centre of 29 active operating rooms. Together, the team performs over 25,000 surgical procedures each year. Surgeons specialize in areas such as cardiac, transplant, cancer, orthopedics, thoracic, vascular, urology and plastic surgery.

Dr. Taylor stressed that although the team is continually finding ways to innovate, it is thanks to "the tremendous courage of our patients" that they can find new and better ways to operate.

Dr. Taylor related some moving stories about patients who were able to overcome devastating conditions with the help of a skilled surgical team. He also related an amazing story of a teenage girl in China who had just been diagnosed with a brain tumour. In a fortunate coincidence, a group of TWH doctors happened to be in China at the time, including Dr. Mark Bernstein, who then performed an awake craniotomy – providing dramatic relief for the 16-year-old. That kind of dedication, according to Dr. Taylor, pervades the surgical team. "We are with our patients every step of the way."

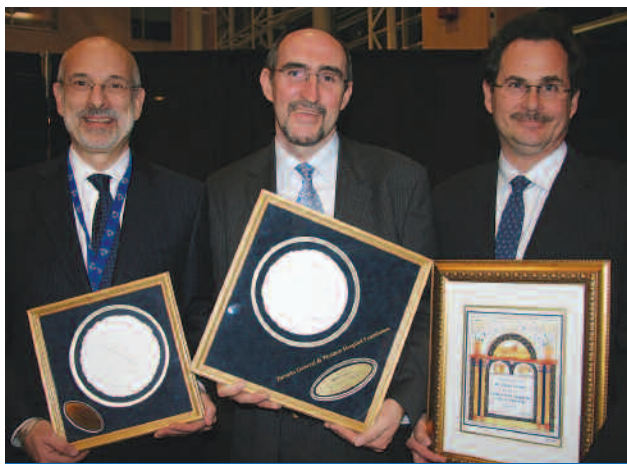
Corporate donors fuel research and innovation

Creating a better health care infrastructure

Pulmonary Hypertension (PAH), a condition where patients experience a relentless loss in their ability to perform daily activities due to breathlessness, chest pain, fainting and eventually death, is growing into a major concern. At Toronto General Hospital, this complex life threatening disease is fought with an intense program dedicated to educating patients and the public about PAH, training young clinicians and investigators, recording and tracking cases and important research.

In view of the need to raise awareness and strengthen the PAH program, Actelion Pharmaceuticals generously supported the infrastructural development of the PAH program with a gift of \$138,500. Funding included support for clinical and research staff in addition to the creation of database systems that tracked patients' progression. In recognition of the gift, the Actelion Pharmaceuticals Team Education Room Plaque was unveiled in the Respiriology Clinic at Toronto General Hospital.

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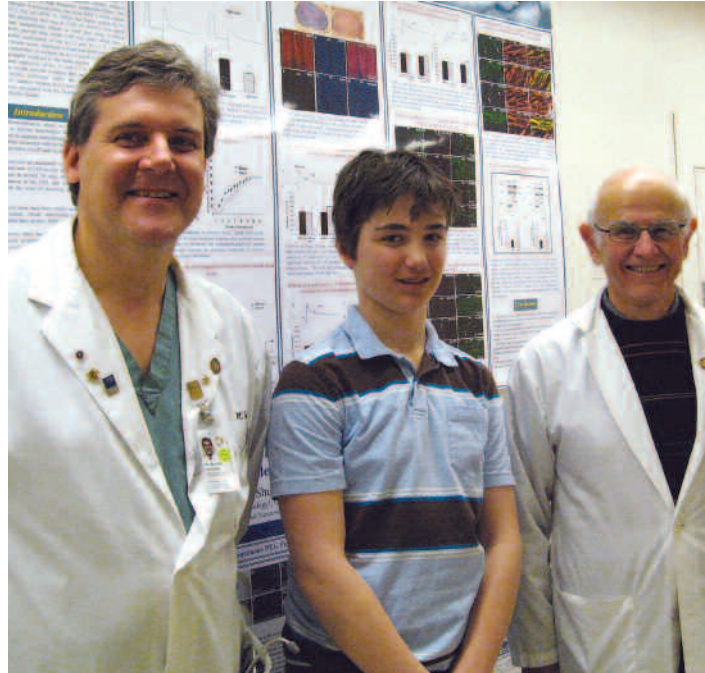

A family crisis changed the way Neil Ritchie perceived life. Neil's father, Dugald, underwent quadruple bypass surgery and pneumonia complications in the fight for his life. Thanks to the amazing support and medical expertise he received at Toronto General Hospital's Cardiovascular Intensive Care Unit (CVICU), he survived.

That's when Neil thought of doing something special in honour of his Dad and his healthcare team. With TG&WHF, he created the 'Do It For Dugald' webpage, ran the Toronto Half Marathon and invited friends, family and business associates to support his efforts to raise funds for the CVICU Nursing Education Fund.

Neil's dedication and the generosity of many resulted in over \$25,000! The funds will benefit the research careers of acute cardiac care nurses through post-graduate studies, international symposiums and state-of-the-art continuing education technology.

A reception is being planned, with CVICU staff attending, to honour the Ritchie family and to present them with an Upper Canada Medal for their gift. The donation is also recognized on the Peter Munk Cardiac Program Donor Wall. 🌀
